About the College

Jesus and Mary College was founded in July 1968 as a constituent college of the University of Delhi. It is run by the Sisters of Jesus and Mary Congregation founded by St. Claudine Thevenet in France 1818. The motto of the College is *THOU ART LIGHT*, *FILL ME WITH THY LIGHT*. About the International Conference

Globally, plastic and its consumption is one of the most significant challenges to life on earth. According to UNEP, around the world, one million plastic drinking bottles are purchased every minute, while up to 5 trillion single-uses plastic bags are used worldwide every year. In total, half of all plastic produced is designed to be used only once — and then thrown away. Plastic waste is now so ubiquitous in the natural environment that it could even mark dominant influence on ecological climate and the beginning of the Anthropocene Era.

Researchers estimate that more than 8.3 billion tonnes of plastic has been produced since the early 1950s. About 60% of that plastic has ended up either in a landfill or in the natural environment in some form or another. More than 99% of plastic is produced from chemicals de-rived from oil, natural gas and coal — all of which are non-renewable resources and leave a huge carbon footprints into the environment. If present scenario continues then by 2050 the plastic industry could account for 20% of the world's total oil consumption. However, the more threatening aspect is that only 9% of all the plastic waste ever produced has been recycled, while the remaining 81% has either been dumped in landfills, incinerated or burnt. This not only results in air-borne diseases but also drastically affects marine life. About 8 million tonnes of plastic goes into world's oceans annually.

The durable and non-degradation characteristics of plastic make it nearly impossible to completely break down the plastic items. As a result of which it is never completely disappeared and its particulates remain in the environment. Plastic waste either seeps into the rivers, or oceans, or persists in land for centuries.

According to a study, on an average, each one of us consumes 126 to 142 tiny plastic elements every day and the situation is worse in the developing countries like India where population is high but awareness regarding plastic pollution is low. Consumption of plastic in one form or another is causing lots of physical and mental disorders. It can take hundreds or even thousands of years for plastic to break down, so the damage to the environment is long-lasting. According to Central Pollution Control Board (India), about 70% of the plastic the country consumes is simply discarded and there is no processing of waste in most Indian cities. As a result the world's largest democracy is home to vast trash mountains that loom over the out- skirts of major cities, and huge quantities of plastic end up in the water bodies and air.

Aim of the Conference

This International Conference aims at:

- Providing opportunity to the academicians, economists, technologists, scientists, industry experts, researchers, students and civil society members to present and observe their views, innovative ideas and latest research results to make India plastic free.
- Creating awareness and to educate students of different streams and programs for making India plastic free.
- Providing a platform for students, teachers and researchers to discuss and share knowledge and skills to evolve better solutions to remove plastic from ecosystems and environment to make the country plastic free.
- Developing the plan of action, suggestions, methods and procedures using innovative approaches to curb plastic use.
- To disseminate information and documents for better solutions among citizens for plastic pollution management.

India produces huge amount of plastic pollution, therefore we must act to protect our environment and to improve environmental health of every species. Important tourist places in and around Delhi

- **Red Fort** *Pride of Mughal Dynasty*: The Red Fort is an epitome of the Mughal era in India and is the face of tourist attractions in Delhi. This Fort has declared a UNESCO World Heritage.
- *India Gate India's Largest War Memorial*: India Gate was built in 1931 as a memorial for martyrs of World War I and war in Afghanistan at Rajpath, the structure looks amazing in evening lights.
- **Qutub Minar** Majestic Stone Structure: Qutub Minar was declared as one of the UNESCO World Heritage Site. It is an amazing example of the beautiful Iranian architecture along with Parso-Arabic and Nagari details.
- Jantar Mantar World's Largest Sundial: Constructed in 1724 by Maharaja Jai Singh of Jaipur, Jantar Mantar is an astronomical observatory. It was also built by Maharaja Jai Singh II.
- *Humayun's Tomb The Garden of Tombs*: Among the best places to visit in Delhi, and a world heritage site under UNESCO, Humayun's Tomb was built in 1570 by Humayun's wife Haji Begum. It is unarguably one of *the most amazing works of Mughal Architecture*.
- Akshardham Temple: One of the largest Hindu temples in the world with its stunning architectural work made of the pink stone and white marble. Located on the banks of the Yamuna River, this Delhi tourist place has lots of exhibits for the visitors. The theme-based garden is really an exciting place to visit here. And while you are here, don't forget to visit the Sahaj Anand Water Show.
- *ISKCON Temple*: ISKCON is a spiritual institution founded by His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada in 1966. You can see the beautiful visual presentations of Bhagavad Gita with colorful lights that create a wonderful effect on the huge screen.
- Lotus Temple: Lotus temple in the list of famous tourist places in Delhi and allows 2500 visitors at the same time. For mesmerizing architecture, this building has achieved several awards and rewards.
- Palika Bazaar and Janpath Market Shop: Set up in the late 1970s, it is one of the famous underground market located between the inner and outer circle of Connaught Place.
- National Museum Take a leap into History: The National Museum of India is one of the largest museums in Delhi. The main exhibits of this museum are the vivid collections of Indian and foreign art.
- The Educational National Gallery of Modern Art for Art Lovers: This is one of the major and largest national galleries of modern art. You can visit more than 14000 works of renowned artists, whether national or international at this museum.
- Okhla Bird Sanctuary Feel the nature: Considered one of Delhi's most fun and exciting places owing to the natural splendor and one of the best places in Delhi for birdwatchers and nature lovers.
- Visit the Taj Mahal at Agra (about 200 kms from Delhi): It is one of the wonders of the world so make sure you wake up for sunrise to see the Taj Mahal with some epic colors in the sky shining on the majestic structure. Agra Fort is also important tourist place at Agra. It was the primary residence of the emperors of the Mughal Dynasty up until 1638 when the capital of India was actually shifted from Agra to Delhi, so the complex holds some huge significance in the history of the nation.
