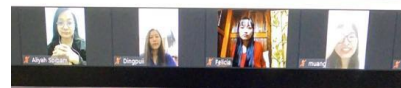

3.Documentary Screening on Nagaland

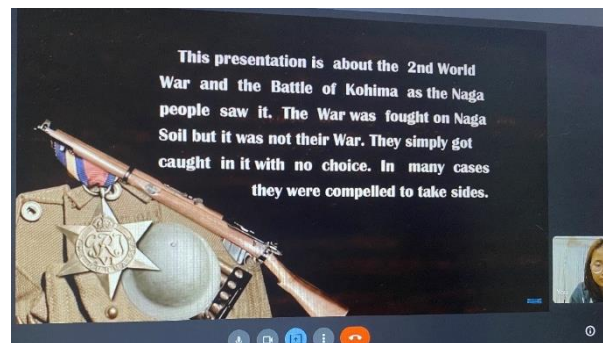



Not to mention it also shows how during the war time , the locals had some amount of influenced from the Japanese soldiers. There were direct interviews with the locals who at that time has encountered the Japanese soldiers and some even worked for them. And how the Japanese people even after the war had left some amount of its influence to the locals for the villages and areas where the Japanese soldiers had stayed .

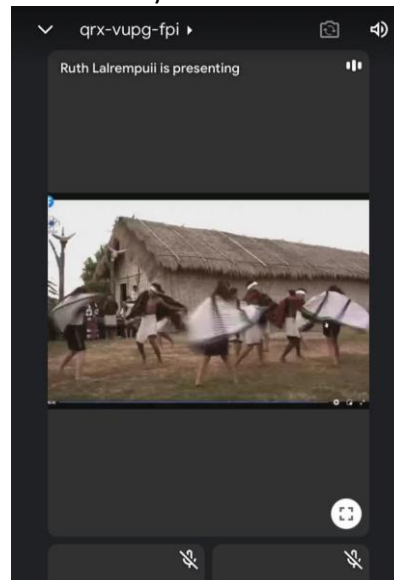
Some locals during the interview mentioned that, they did labour work such as carrying their luggage for them when the soldiers travelled from one village to another . The locals in the villages were also forced to serve them at their house as guest and take care of their flooding and logging . Some locals said



that during that time , at schools kids were taught Japanese songs . In which they

Most of the locals were scared of them since at that time, Nagaland didn't have the source and facilities like the Japanese soldiers did which made the locals feel scared of them. 4. Documentary Screening on Arunachal Pradesh	17-02-2021	49 students	0	<p>This documentary called Chi Lupo ('Chi' refers to honey, while 'Lupo' refers to hunter), which spectacularly documents this skillful practice of collecting honey from hives perched on 5rocky hilltops.Kezang D Thongdok presents that with the advent of modernisation, honey hunting is rapidly fading away, and within three or four years, this unique practice will probably fade out since the young generation isn't interested in hunting and harvesting for honey because it's rigorous work. This practice is under threat. The Shertukpens are known famously for the now dying skill of honey hunting.Shertukpens are Located within the eastern fringes of the Himalayan ranges in Western Arunachal Pradesh's West Kameng district. They are a conglomeration of nearly 12 villages. Despite their long lineage of Tibetan ancestry and inheriting Tibetan Buddhist culture, "the Sherdukpens are more inclined to their pre-Buddhist animistic traditions,".Making them particularly unique are their very small numbers. There are barely 4,000+ speakers of their native tongue also known as Shertukpen which has no written script. This documentary recently won 'best documentary' at the 10th Dada Saheb Phalke Film Festival award. The meeting ended with an interactive question and answer round and few students shared their feedbacks on the documentary.</p> 
5.Documentary Screening on	24-02-2021	50	0	<p>The documentary was shown through online platform via google meet. The documentary shows the different dances of</p>

the people of Mizoram and reflects the cultural vibrancy of the place. Deriving inspiration from the natural beauty of the hilly terrains, the dances of Mizoram are synonymous to the multi-cultural aura of Mizoram. The document showcases different forms of dancing like Cheraw Dance which is performed by both males and females using bamboo sticks which is generally moved by male dancers, Cheilam Dance performed over a round of rice beer, Chawnglaizawn folk dance performed either to mourn a wife or to celebrate victories, Tlanglam dance performed all throughout the state and is one of the most popular and Zangtalam dance usually performed at night. All of these dances are performed using very few instruments like the gong and drum. The dance expresses the carefree spirit of the people of Mizoram. The documentary was indeed very knowledgeable to all, as it shows the student different types of dances but also the background and history of the dances performed by the Mizos', which most of the students did not know about. The event concluded with small discussion on the documentary.



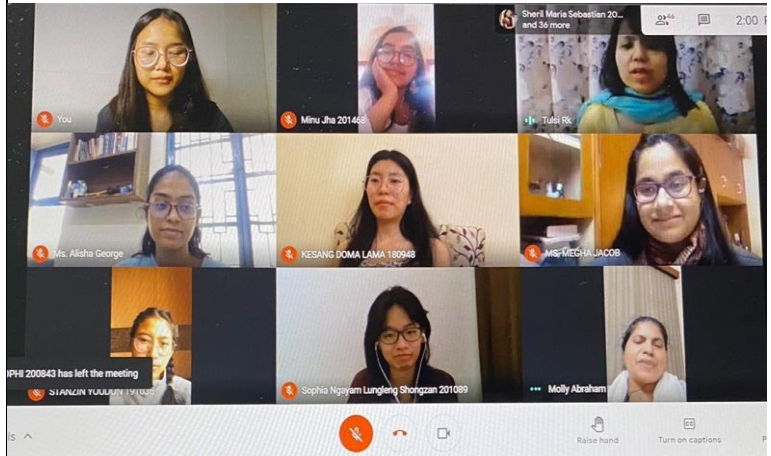
6. Webinar on “The North East Indian Women in Leadership Roles.”
