About the Speakers

Debashis Bandyopadhyay is Professor of English and Coordinator of the Centre for Stress Management at Vidyasagar University, in Midnapore, India. Formerly he was Professor of English at Banaras Hindu University, Visiting Professor at University of Guanajuato, Salamanca, Mexico, Associate Professor at Presidency College, Kolkata and Faculty Adjunct in California State University, Fresno, California, USA. As a Fulbright Fellow he pursued research on the sense of acculturation among the Armenian American people in the USA and as a Charles Wallace Fellow he worked on Goldwin Smith and the American Civil War in St Antony's College, University of Oxford, UK. His research interests include literature, culture studies and psychoanalysis. He is presently engaged in psychoanalytic research on Mindfulness based on meditative practices in India. He is widely published in India and abroad.

Rukmini Sen is Professor in Sociology at the School of Liberal Studies of Ambedkar University, Delhi. She is also the Director of the Centre for Publishing at AUD since June 2019. She has previously worked at WB National University of Juridical Sciences and Centre for Women's Development Studies. She is teaching courses on Law and Society, Relationships and Affinities, Gender and Society, and Social Research, Women's Movements. She is a member of the National Human Rights Commission since 2019, as a gender-expert, and was a member of the expert team on women and law for the National Commission for Women between 2010-2012. She is Co-investigator in the ongoing research project: Feminist Taleem: Teaching Feminisms, Transforming Lives: Questions of Identity, Pedagogy and Violence in India and the UK (2017-20; Ongoing). This project is funded by UGC-UKERI in collaboration with the University of Edinburgh, Scotland.

Webinar Summary

On 12 June 2020, IQAC, in collaboration with Department of English organized a webinar titled "Impact of the Pandemic on the Metropolitan Middle-Class Indian Woman". It began with a warm welcome by the moderator, Ms. Dolly Kapoor, Teacher-In-Charge, Department of English wherein Ms. Kapoor welcomed everyone and introduced the esteemed guests. She expressed her heartfelt gratitude towards the Principal, Sr. (Dr.) Rosily T.L. r.j.m. and invited her to address the audience and invoke the blessings of God. Sr. Rosily began with an emphasis on the relevance of the topic of the webinar, followed by a prayer to the Lord Almighty for all those who are suffering due to the pandemic and the cyclone Amphan. She concluded by congratulating and thanking the Department of English and the Webinar Committee for organizing the webinar.

Before inviting the first speaker of the day, Ms. Kapoor introduced and contextualized the theme of the webinar, stressing on the gender implications of the pandemic. She further discussed the new normal vis-a-vis the changing notions of 'home' and family in the wake of the imposed lockdown. In this context, the altering dynamics between public and private spaces sharpened the pressures and challenges faced by the Indian middle class woman, rupturing the narrative of family bonding and harmony.

Ms. Kapoor's introduction was followed by the lecture by Prof. Debashis Bandyopadhyay who spoke on 'women and the pandemic: the emergence of a new normal'. Prof. Bandyopadhyay began by expressing his gratitude towards the Department of English and the Principal, JMC. In his talk, Prof. Bandyopadhyay problematized the concept of the 'normal' in the context of the pandemic that revealed the rather dismal socio-economic realities of the country. As the Coordinator of the Centre for Stress Management, Prof. Bandyopadhyay has been working with a large team of Clinical Psychologists and Psychoanalysts, and as practicing psychoanalyst, Prof. Bandyopadhyay and his team have conducted case studies on the impact of the pandemic on women and their relationships. In his talk, he referred to several case studies that further enriched the discussion. Further, he investigated if our definition and understanding of the normal was going to change due to the pandemic. He concluded his talk with a discussion of the inherently contradictory behaviors, and the emerging crisis within the middle-class, and questioned whether the short-term adjustments of man-woman relationships can really lead to a paradigmatic shift.


Prof. Bandyopadhyay's lecture was followed by Prof. Rukmini Sen's lecture on 'the burden of multitasking on working women, and domestic violence'. Prof. Sen began by thanking the Department of English for organizing a webinar and bringing together people to discuss issues of contemporary relevance during the pandemic. She began the lecture with a quote from Albert Camus' *The Plague*. Living in the interstices of hope and despair, gendered experiences of the pandemic become vital to discuss as all disasters and wars have always had a gendered impact. Within this context, Prof. Sen took up three concepts — home, work and violence — to discuss questions of multitasking and the pandemic. Prof. Sen discussed the gendered impact of the pandemic through examples of communications and advisories on the pandemic by the State and government bodies, and images of multitasking women working from home and taking the "home" to the workplace. In this context, she discussed how the divide between the public and private is being blurred or rearranged and argued for a material meaning and definition of housework. In the absence of the support services that enable women to perform housework, she discussed what it then meant to work *from* home and work *at* home. Prof. Sen concluded her talk on a hopeful note with a discussion of feminist futures.

The webinar concluded with a lively question and answer session moderated by Ms. Jennifer Monteiro, Assistant Professor, Department of English after Ms. Monteiro provided a succinct summary of the lectures for the audience. Following this Dr. Alka Marwaha, IQAC Coordinator, gave the vote of thanks. She expressed her gratitude towards both the speakers of the webinar and thanked the Department of English and the Webinar Committee for organizing an engaging webinar on a pertinent topic. She also thanked Sr. Rosily for being a pillar of support to the faculty members involved in organizing webinars. She concluded her vote of thanks by thanking the participants and inviting them for webinars organized by Jesus and Mary College in the future.

Feedback Summary: After the webinar, the feedback form was circulated and received 200 responses from 104 institutions all over the country. Of these responses 22%, i.e. 44 were from Jesus and Mary College. The feedback was overwhelmingly and unanimously positive. Below is a brief analysis of the data from the feedback forms:


Relevance of the webinar to respondents (on a scale of 1 to 5):

155 of the 200 i.e. 77.5% of the respondents rated the relevance of the webinar on the highest score of 5, 38 scored it 4, 6 scored it 3, 1 scored it 2, while none scored it 1.




Response to whether the content met the respondent's expectations (on a scale of 1 to 5):

117 out of 200 i.e. 58.5% of the respondents scored the content of the webinar 5, 75 scored it 4, 6 scored it 3, 2 scored it 2, while none scored it 1.

97% of respondents, i.e. 194 out of 200, expressed willingness to attend more webinars organized by the college.
