About the speaker: Dr. Saurav Kumar Rai has a Ph. D from Department of History, University of Delhi. His area of research interest is History of Health and Medicine. He has published extensively on health and medicine in India. Some of the very interesting articles deserve special mention. "Invoking 'Hindu' Ayurveda: Communalisation of the Late Colonial Ayurvedic Discourse" was published in in *Indian Economic and Social History Review*; 'Gendering Late Colonial Ayurvedic Discourse: United Provinces, c.1890-1937' was published in *History and Sociology of South Asia*; "Gazing at the Woman's Body: Historicising Lust and Lechery in a Patriarchal Society" was published in *Social Scientist*.

Webinar Summary

The webinar titled "Colonialism and the History of Epidemics: Lessons from the Past" was organized by IQAC in collaboration with the Department of History on 8 June 2020. The speaker Dr. Saurav Kumar Rai is an eminent historian. The webinar began with the Teacher-In-Charge Dr. Amita Paliwal's welcome address and introduction of the speaker. Following this, the Principal Sr. (Dr.) Rosily T.L. addressed the audience. Sr. Rosily contextualized the importance of the webinar and invoked the blessings of God on all those in the world who were suffering. She also congratulated all the members of the Webinar Committee for organizing the webinar.


Dr. Saurav Kumar Rai began his lecture by dividing it into two parts; first, historicity of epidemics and second, how to make sense of the phenomena called epidemics. He argued that the history of disease is as old as the history of civilization. Pre-modern diseases were confined to particular geographies. He shared instances of spread of diseases from ancient and medieval India, which remained limited to small geographical areas. He argued that with modernity the nature of the spread of diseases changed. In the Indian context, colonialism and modernity being intertwined, colonialism played a significant role in this change. Dr. Rai further delineated how the mobility due to colonialism provided swiftness to the spread of diseases along with changing the nature of spread from endemic to epidemic to pandemic. He then went on to outline the history of the cholera outbreak in the 19th century. The outbreak of cholera led to concerns regarding containment of epidemic and sanitation, which directly impacted the structure, and design of modern cities in colonial India. Further, he discussed how the anti-plague measures led to discontentment amongst upper-caste Indians, which was a catalyst to the Indian National Movement. He concluded his lecture with a discussion of the socio-economic and political impact of epidemics on societies throughout history.

The lecture was followed by the Question and Answer session moderated by Dr. Richa Raj, who succinctly summarized Dr. Rai's lecture briefly for the audience before taking up questions posed to Dr. Rai on Google Meet chat and YouTube comments. Dr. Rai responded to a variety of questions ranging from issues of gender bias in the Ayurvedic discourse, relation of authoritarianism or fascism with control of epidemics, philanthropic and missionary work amongst leprosy patients in Colonial Uttarakhand, psychological impact of quarantine during the Spanish Flu, Epidemic Disease Act of 1897, to communalization of Ayurveda in late colonial India. The Q/A. session was interactive and informative. The webinar concluded with the vote of thanks proposed by Dr. Ameeta Motwani, Convenor, Webinar Committee. Dr. Motwani thanked Dr. Rai for addressing the audience, Sr. Rosily for her encouragement, Dr. Alka Marwaha, IQAC Coordinator, for her consistent support and the entire Webinar Committee for their tireless efforts in the smooth running of the webinar. She concluded by congratulating the Department of History for organizing this webinar with a record participation of 250, the highest number of participants till date for a JMC webinar.


