<u>PUBLIC LECTURE</u> Date: 2nd March, 2020

On **2nd March 2020** Public Policy and Analysis JMC - in collaboration with Internal Quality Assurance Cell- organized an informative speaker session by Professor Mark Kayser from Hertie School of Governance, Germany. The main ideas of the lecture stemmed from Prof. Kayser's research paper 'Downward Class Mobility and Far-Right Party Support' which bore key insights into the phenomenon of 'Populism in Europe'.

This informative session bore key insights into the phenomenon of 'Populism in Europe'. Elucidating the research methodology and econometric models adopted, Prof. Kayser drew a dynamic and multi-dimensional parallel between inter-generational occupational mobility and the tendency to support far right political parties, in both general and the European contexts. He argued for the existence of non-spurious correlation- both direct and indirect - between cultural and economic factors and the consequent voting patterns in any given region and evidenced the same with data on the trends of inter-generational occupational mobility and populism in Europe during the last few decades.

In this era of intensifying public tendencies towards demagoguery, Prof. Kayser, with his latest research, lifts populist veils and thus, equips us- the voters of today and tomorrow-with a bird's eye-view of 'ground zero'. The attendees appreciated not only Prof. Kayser's keen observations, but also his effort to impart to his audience, as much as possible, the invaluable skill of data interpretation. Post the lecture, a constructive Q&A round followed.

A total of 105 students, our Principal, Sr. (Dr.) Rosily T.L. r.j.m. and 11 Faculty Members were present for the lecture which was followed by lunch for the guests (Mr. Axel Bausch, MD Hertie School, Berlin and Prof. Kayser) and the JMC faculty members.
