As in-charges of the English section of the college magazine and Convenors of the Magazine Society, the Department trains both English honours and other college students in the practices of copyediting, proofreading, page design, layout, and the other nuances of publishing. The online Department Magazine, <i>Bricolage</i> , also affords students to learn and hone these skills through the frameworks of e-publishing. Text dramatizations allow students to learn the different processes of putting up a production, whether as a more modest classroom group skit/mime or as full-fledged theatrical performance—from script writing to costume and prop designing, direction, acting, light and sound effects, among others.






Department. On the day of the event three more members of the English Department volunteered their help.

STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES:

2015-2016

SWOC Analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Challenges) Strengths

- The English Department has a well-planned annual calendar of various academic, co-curricular activities, seminars, talks, interactions with authors, dramatic productions of texts, etc.
- The Department of English has the unique distinction in the college of offering MA Programme thereby making JMC one of the handful of colleges in Delhi University that has an MA programme in English. Faculty members of the department tutor MA students.

Weaknesses

• The N-list access that was provided for a couple of years to college faculty is no longer functional. Printers, printouts, laptops, stationery and other such accourrements that aid teaching-learning should be made available.

Opportunities

• The Department wants to utilise strategic location of the college and enter into collaborative ventures with the embassies in the vicinity.

Challenges

• The full teaching workload mandated by UGC in the semester system puts a lot of pressure on all those involved in the teaching-learning process as finding time is increasingly becoming the biggest challenge for both students and teachers.

2016-2017

SWOC Analysis

Strengths

- The Department of English has a very strong inclination towards research and faculty members are actively involved in publishing research papers and participating in conferences, seminars and workshops related to English literature and allied fields. The Department also actively encourages students to participate in seminars and conferences. A faculty member from the department is also the founding editor of JMC's Inter-Disciplinary E-journal for publishing refereed scholarly research. Another faculty member is the convenor of the Literary Magazine of the Department. The college magazine has been the responsibility of the English Department ever since its inception.
- Different members of the Department have been associated in various capacities with the DSC South Asian Writing Prize from time to time and are also members of prestigious literary societies.
- The JMC English Department attracts students from diverse educational, linguistic, socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds. This contributes in transforming departmental activities and everyday pedagogy into a truly enriching experience as students and teachers maneuver through varied cultures and meaning-making processes.

Weaknesses

• The Department often feels the need for infrastructural upgradation. Facilities such as high speed, uninterrupted wi-fi and electronic access to scholarly journal databases (both on the college premises as well as remote access) are crucial for faculty to stay up to date with and contribute to advances in their chosen disciplines.

Opportunities

• The Department intends to put the strategic location of the college to its advantage and pursue collaborative ventures with the embassies in the neighbourhood.

Challenges

• Given the full teaching workload mandated by UGC in the semester system, finding time is increasingly becoming the biggest challenge that teachers are faced with. They struggle to strike a balance between finding adequate time for class prep, evaluating a large number of assignments of a subjective nature that necessitate careful reading and detailed feedback etc. Consequently, finding time to put forth quality output whether as teachers, mentors, organisers of various college events is a challenge. The limited time span of the semester increases the pressure on all the stakeholders in the teaching-learning process.

2017-2018 SWOC Analysis

Strengths

- The JMC English Department is fortunate to have struck a very healthy equilibrium in terms of Teacher and Student Diversity. The faculty is a perfect amalgamation of youth, experience, expertise and innovation.
- The Faculty members of the Department have specializations in varied areas and aspects of literature and students get to experience a variety of themes, ideas, topics, texts and traditions for comprehending their curriculum.
- Infrastructure in terms of decent classroom space and a commodious department room that gives teachers a space to retire to, to pursue their work in peace are other strengths which bolster the teaching-learning processes.

Weaknesses

- The large size of BA Programme classes poses a problem. The excessive numbers (running into the 70s and 80s per section) hinder effective curriculum delivery at times. It is significant to give individual attention to students when teaching them language, communication and writing skills. But individual attention is exactly what is made difficult when even a tutorial group is made up of 15-20 students on an average.
- The Department is not very resourceful when it comes to utilising different sources to sponsor various departmental projects/activities. This is an area that it has flagged for itself as something to work on to improve in the years to come.

Opportunities

• The Department purports to tie-up with other universities and industries for skill training, expertise and knowledge-sharing, internships for students, among other things.

Challenges

• Finding funding for literary projects is becoming a challenge for the Department at a time when empirical, techno-scientific, utilitarian, and economic imperatives decide value.

2018-2019

SWOC Analysis

Strengths

- The faculty of the Department of English has diverse specializations, achievements and skillsets, bringing together the perfect balance of youth and experience across a vast range of literary and other arenas.
- Faculty members of the Department specialize in different arenas of literature and also use diverse teaching pedagogies to ensure that the students are offered the best possible learning environment.
- Our students are very resourceful and have stepped up their ability to execute departmental events at a very high level over the years. They have honed their financial acumen when securing funding for Literati, and manage all organizational aspects of the fest themselves.
- Members of the English Department have contributed significantly in different capacities to college events, and have played a pivotal role in institution-building at Jesus and Mary College.

Weaknesses

• Due to the expansive class-size of certain combinations, personalized attention becomes a problem, even in the tutorial setup because reducing a class of 60-70 students into four groups still makes the group size to be 15 or more.

Opportunities

• The Department can use its interdisciplinary relevance to target a wide range of topics wherein to contribute its expertise.

Challenges

• Due to the utility driven nature of the academic 'market', it is sometimes difficult to explain the discipline's viability and significance in purely economic terms.

2019-2020

SWOC Analysis

Strengths

- The Department of English, JMC, has an interdisciplinary approach towards the teaching-learning process. All faculty members of the department deploy diverse discursive methodologies within the classroom by engaging with the fields of History, Political Science, Sociology, Economics, Philosophy, Film Studies, Critical Theory, especially because the English curriculum demands this interdisciplinarity in the discussion of its themes.
- The JMC English Department attracts students from variegated ethnic, geographical and educational contexts. This creates an environment of diverse ideological engagement, and converts classrooms into comprehensive spaces of cultural learning.
- As has been demonstrated through the ATR, the Department has a rich culture of amalgamating education through not just academic talks, discussions, and seminars, but through a varied mix of co-curricular and extra-curricular events and practices that ensure that the students are given a holistic education.
- As established by the students' feedback analysis, the Department is elated to know that it has performed well across all response categories, underscoring how the Department of English, JMC, has not only fulfilled its academic goals but also validated the Department's contribution to the educational vision of the college.
- The Department of English has the unique distinction in college to be offering an M.A. Programme to the students of University of Delhi.

Weaknesses

- While the last few years have seen a vast improvement in JMC's physical and technological infrastructure, the Department still feels the need for a more uninterrupted and systematic access to this infrastructure to ensure a seamless research and teaching experience.
- Printers, printouts, laptops, stationery and other such paraphernalia that aid teaching-learning should be made available to aid the faculty in carrying out their lectures in an unhindered manner.

Opportunities

- The Department aims to utilize its strategic closeness to embassies through some kind of an institutional or project-based association.
- The Department would like to utilize all possible opportunities to create a richer research culture for our students, and also balance academic learning with a robust social outreach programme to offer a rounded education to our students.

Challenges

• Due to the university shutdown in March, the teaching session had to suddenly shift online. It is something that all stakeholders of the Institution and Department are still grappling with in its tangible manifestations.







Co-Curricular: Theatrical Productions










Poster for the College Performance of the Play

Mentoring processes allow our students to confide in teachers about their problems, doubts, in absolute confidentiality and without the fear of being judged.

MENTOR- WARD PROGRAMME

The Department divides students into groups and individual teachers are assigned to them and meet them according to fixed periods on the time table and even otherwise, to advise and guide them in matters pertaining to academics and their overall well-being. Additionally, the JMC English Department rigorously follows its weekly tutorials and offers continuous mentoring to all its students. These tutorials facilitate student-teacher bonding and provide teachers with opportunities to gauge the strengths and weaknesses of students as they meet them in smaller batches.

MENTOR-WARD PROGRAMME

The Department has organized students into small groups and allotted them faculty members who are available to them in assigned periods and even otherwise, to provide guidance and mentorship. The Department also regularly conducts its weekly tutorials and the faculty mentors students in small batches so as to facilitate easy comprehension of the prescribed texts. These tutorials enable teachers to address any doubts and confusions that students might have with respect to the professional scope of their subjects or any other difficulty they might be experiencing in the class room or otherwise.

Account— During the first week of the academic year in January 2020, a mentoring session was conducted with the students with regard to the experience of studying English as their honours discipline. All the students were encouraged to share with their peers on a voluntary basis. After a sharing session which saw the participation of the most of the students, the mentor assigned academic and personal goal posts to target in the next one-year and two-year periods. The individual contact details of the faculty and the free slots in his time-table for one-on-one sessions.

There were multiple short and long counselling sessions conducted with individual students over the course of the Academic Year 2019-2020. A brief overview of some of the interactions are listed below:

- i. Student X1 prefers to avoid all public speaking even at the cost of academic penalties. An attempt was made to start conversations in smaller group settings involving her best friends and an attempt was made to have conversations with the mentor in class as a conversation.
- ii. Student X2 is disillusioned with the course choice she has made as the subject failed to kindle any passion in her. We had several conversations on internships as well as allied academic areas and careers that she could pursue. We attempted to find a balance between acceptable standards of performance in the course and the pursuit of these alternatives.
- iii. Student X3 is creative and gifted. She suffers from anger management issues, which occasionally results in self-harm. During the course of the year, we had several

conversations in person and over phone on issues that trigger emotional reactions and means to avoid them. (The mentor recommended her the counselling support provided by the college. However, she prefers to find and seek help from someone outside the college, a wish the mentor respected.)

- iv. Student X4 is staying in a PG and misses her home. At the same time, she feels that this homesickness a weakness and antithetical to the kind of personality that she believes she is. Mentor attempted to reassure her that it is part of a process that all young adults undergo.
- v. Student X5 is one of the most active students in the group, yet she is troubled by a traumatic event from her childhood. This results in occasional moodiness and rare bouts of emotional breakdowns. In addition, she has complained about her family members not believing in her abilities. The mentor is part of a network of support that helps her navigate through the emotional roller-coaster. Mentor also had a conversation with her parents when they visited college, where he appraised them of her curricular and co-curricular achievements and abilities.

- i. <u>Career counselling:</u> Students had queries regarding career options after a course in EE-HS. I provided the details of the relevant PG courses, universities that offer these courses and a list of possible job options suitable for the students.
- ii. Requirement of Letter of Recommendation: Met students who were seeking a LOR from me. Discussed the details of the PG courses they had applied for. Wrote and

sent informed recommendation letters for them in the capacity of teaching them in all three years of their graduation.

iii. <u>OBE</u> and other <u>Pandemic Related issues</u>: I did not teach this batch in the last semester but had frequent communication through platforms like email and WhatsApp to answer doubts regarding the pattern of OBE. Some students also discussed the personal issues they were facing during the lockdown. I remained available to listen to them and suggested the intervention of college counsellors when required.

Extra-Curricular Activities




