To celebrate the third anniversary of Swachh Bharat the Government of India launched an initiative in the important sphere of Swachhta. The period from 15th September 2017 to 2nd October 2017 was earmarked as 'SWACHHTA HI SEVA', the objective of which was to strengthen the existing measures being undertaken in ensuring all round hygiene so that the mission mode pursuit leads to a mindset of zero tolerance towards anything unhygienic.

With great zeal and enthusiasm, NSS JMC took upon the endeavour and worked towards achieving the best result. As part of the project NSS implemented and executed the specified activities in the campus during the above-said period.

The project 'Swachhta Hi Seva' commenced with an Oath Taking Ceremony led by the Principal of the college wherein more than hundred student volunteers along with the teachers and NSS Team assembled in the common room to take the pledge to observe hygiene and cleanliness in all aspects of daily life and to sensitize others to follow suit.

The NSS team got together and collected plastic dustbins, garbage bags, shampoo sachets, hand wash and paper soaps to be distributed among the slum dwellers. The team visited them and communicated with the women and the children of the area, explaining the need for basic hygiene in their day to day life. The same day the team organized and took out a rally on Hygiene Sensitization in the campus.

The NSS JMC coordinated and synchronized a poster making competition inviting students to participate and express their perception through artwork, of a clean and green environment. The posters were displayed in the amphitheatre of the college for the students to ponder upon.

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
BLOOD DONATION CAMP

NSS JMC in collaboration with Red Cross organised a blood donation camp on 14th September, 2017. The Indian Red Cross is a voluntary humanitarian organization . It is a leading member of the largest independent humanitarian organization in the world, the International Red Cross & Red Crescent Movement.

The Mission of the Indian Red Cross is to inspire, encourage and initiate at all times all forms of humanitarian activities so that human suffering can be minimized and even prevented and thus contribute to creating more congenial climate for peace.

The blood donation drive took place in the basketball court and was from 9am to 2pm, two hundred volunteers came to show their support but only 25 could donate blood due to reasons beyond control. The Red Cross team had taken full precaution and safety for the heath of the volunteers. Towards the end of the drive our principal Sr Dr. Rosily came in support of the cause.

The Indian Red Cross is a pioneer in the field of blood services and one of the largest voluntary blood banks in India. It has more than 100 blood banks all over the country under different states and district branches.

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Seminar cum Panel Discussion on Ill effects of Substance and Drug Abuse (in collaboration with Delhi Government and Udaan) – 28^{th} September, 2017

NSS JMC in collaboration with Delhi government and Udaan organised a seminar cum panel discussion on the ill effects of substance and drug abuse.

Drug use can have a wide range of short- and long-term, direct and indirect effects. These effects often depend on the specific drug or drugs used, how they are taken, how much is taken, the person's health, and other factors. Short-term effects can range from changes in appetite, wakefulness, heart rate, blood pressure, and/or mood to heart attack, stroke, psychosis, overdose, and even death. These health effects may occur after just one use.

Longer-term effects can include heart or lung disease, cancer, mental illness, HIV/AIDS, hepatitis, and others. Long-term drug use can also lead to addiction. Drug addiction is a brain disorder. Not everyone who uses drugs will become addicted, but for some, drug use can change how certain brain circuits work. These brain changes interfere with how people experience normal pleasures in life such as food and sex, their ability to control their stress level, their decision-making, their ability to learn and remember, etc. These changes make it much more difficult for someone to stop taking the drug even when it's having negative effects on their life and they want to quit.

In view of this, NSS JMC invited a highly well versed panel to educate the people. The panel consisted of psychiatrists, recovered addict and speakers from social organisations.

Dr. Kanika Malik has a PH.D in clinical psychology, from national institute of mental health and neuro sciences, Bangalore. She is currently working as intervention director in the PRIDE project. Mr. Kunal Kishan is a senior Technical Advisor with the enterprise application centre pf the UN OICT. He has headed the Drug Prevention and Health programme in South Asia for the office on Drugs and Crime.

Mr Shaleen is an officer on special duty with the chief minister of Delhi. He is also representing Delhi in state executive committees for people with disability.

Mr Yash Badal, who has been clean since 2015 and shared his own experience with alcoholic abuse

This was followed by the panel discussion, where the students were briefed about the ill effects of substance, and their questions were answered.





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
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SPARSH Diwali Mela to Support NGOs

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


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

Hindi Debating Society organised debating competitions on the topics related to Human Values and Professional Ethics. The details are as under:-

I. HUMAN VALUES:

1. Topic of the Debate: 'Shiksha ke dwara Bharat ko bhrashtachar mukt banaya jaa sakta hai' (शिक्षा के द्वारा भारत को भ्रष्टाचार मुक्त बनाया जा सकता है)

Number and Identity of participants:- Approximately 12 participants. All the participants were students of Jesus and Mary college.

Purpose of the event:- We chose these topics for our debating event during the Vigilance week celebration in our college to correlate the link between corruption and education. To inculcate human values in students by making them aware.

II. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS:-

1. Topic of the Debate: 'Social Media manviya mulyo ke liye ghatak hai' (सोशल मीडिया मानवीय मूल्यों के लिए घातक है)

Number and Identity of participants:- Approximately 30 participants. All the participants were students of Undergraduate colleges.

Purpose of the event :- The vitality of choosing this topic lies in the fact that people from all ages and especially large chunk of digitally literate youth has adopted social media as a platform to remain connected to others and to get informed on various issues. This platform comes with its pros and cons on human values like truth, honesty, loyalty etc. which proves it to be important topic to debate.

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NDMC School Project

BAPU DHAM PROJECT REPORT 2017-18

In 2018, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed to increase cooperation between Jesus and Mary College, New Delhi (JMC) and New Delhi Municipal Corporation (NDMC) in areas of mutual interest. Implementation of the Program Activities in this MOU aims to help Jesus and Mary College and New Delhi Municipal Corporation to enrich NP Co-ed Senior Secondary School, Bapu Dham, through transformative practices, multi-level interventions and collaborative partnerships.

Jesus and Mary College has been actively engaging in various activities at the N.P. Co-Ed Senior Secondary School. The focus of the activities has been to generate long term synergies between the School and the College for the welfare of students attending the school. The areas identified for intervention are language, mathematics, environmental issues, mental health, and other psychological aspects ,sports, computer literacy, networking with agencies who are already working in the area and can contribute to the school. To make the impact of intervention sustainable we would facilitate teacher training and work on school culture that promotes enquiry and inclusive growth of teachers and students. The school library is a rich resource, and the infrastructure is also very suitable. We would like to instill processes that ensure optimum usage of these resources. The activities so far have focused on the following areas:

1. Psychological Aspects

The activities in this area have focused on the needs to assess the psychological needs of students of different age groups and intervene where needed. At the primary level of students, the focus has been to explore and deal with health and psychosomatic concerns that inhibit the adjustment of the child in school. At the middle level, the focus has been extended to explore and understand the development of self-concept as a notion and also investigate the gaps in the same. It has targeted to discover and deal with teenage concerns such as body image, bully behaviour, peer pressure, social media, cyber bullying etc. at the senior level of students, and aimed at understanding and dealing with career concerns, performance anxiety, stress and interpersonal concerns.

Our team has conducted a baseline needs assessment at the school. This involved several meetings with the principal and senior staff to understand the needs and issues pertaining to mental health and to gauge the level of awareness amongst students and teachers on mental health. In the thematic analysis of the in depth qualitative interviews, it revealed that several areas warranted immediate psychological intervention such as:

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- 1. Advocacy of mental health
- 2. Construction of self-concept
- 3. Emotional wellbeing of students and teachers
- 4. Managing behavioural disorders
- 5. Art based experiential intervention
- 6. Sensitization of parents at primary level
- 7. Facilitation of factors implicit in learning process
- 8. Enhancement of personal and social sense of self
- 9. Advocacy of factors promoting holistic wellness
- 10. Management of interpersonal conflicts amongst teachers
- 11. Promoting work life balance amongst teaching fraternity.

The psychology team has deliberated on the above findings and is designing customized interventions for the same.

2. Subject Areas

The interactions of our teachers with faculty and students of the schools helped us arrive at two key areas of academic cooperation,

a. Mathematics

A team of students and teachers from our mathematics department conducted a baseline survey at the school to assess the areas of intervention. The main objective of the students was to help students of class 1 and 2 overcome the fear of mathematics. The baseline assessment was conducted by conducting fun activities for ice breaking and thereafter testing the students on their class specific curriculum. This has allowed as to make a general assessment of the math abilities of the students and to further plan specific intervention for the same.

b. English

Based on discussions with the school HM and with teachers we conducted one workshop on reading comprehension for all language teachers- English, Hindi and Urdu . It was found to be very relevant and thought provoking by the teachers and the principal. However the follow-up workshop could not be done due to time constraints and availability of the teachers.

A team of students and teacher from our college conducted an initial ice breaking session with small groups of students through fun activities and poem recitations. This was intended as a first contact with the students before conducting a more detailed baseline assessment of the students English comprehension.

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3. Sports

The sports department of our college has started training the students of the school for cricket and tennis. Currently, 7-8 Students have joined the S.M Cricket Academy of our College. Further, the college has tied up with Petroleum Sports Promotion Board (PSPB) to provide training to the students of the school.

4. Future plan of Action

The broad objective of the activities so far has been to make an initial assessment of the psychological and academic areas for intervention at the school. Our future plan of action involves take a step further towards designing and implementing specific interventions that will benefit the students and attempts will be made to train teachers to make these interventions successful. In addition to these, the following are other objectives that we plan to implement in the near future:

- a. Introduction of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities by:
 - i. Exploring a tie up with the National School of Drama to conduct workshops for students.
 - ii. Training students and thereafter conducting a nukkad-natak competition for the students by the Indian Drama Society of our College.
 - iii. The Model United Nations Society of college will conduct workshop for students so that we can train a team to participate in our college's model united nations conference in January.
- b. Painting the wall and ramps with various educations pictures and games to use the building as a learning resource and provide immersion to the students..
- c. We are in the process of collaborating with organizations such as World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage (INTACH) and Centre for Cultural Resources and Training (CCRT) to organize nature trails, indoor workshops, wildlife talks, hands on experience with artefacts of cultural, historical significance.
- d. We plan to conduct a detailed demographic survey of the students to identify challenges of learning when students have a different mother tongue and also to identify factors that will help reduce the home school divide that children face.
- e. A sample survey (78 households) of the nearby slum cluster 'Sanjay Camp' by the Economics Department of Jesus and Mary College, which lies in the catchment area of the school, has revealed that close to 20% of the school going age children in the sample are currently not enrolled or have dropped out of school. Further, there are several parents who feel that there is no point of educating their girl child beyond class 10. With the support of school, we will make an attempt to get these students to enroll in school as well as provide them with support services to overcome the their inhibitions in educating their girl children.

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f. We will be designing two 30 hour certificate courses on Microsoft Office for the students of class 6 which will help them gain proficiency in computer usage and therefore opening new avenues for learning. We will also be conducting workshops for primary school students which will familiarize them with computer usage as well as teach them basic typing as a gateway tool for learning using the computer. We will also energize use of smart boards available in the classrooms.

g. This academic year onwards, the college will be providing counselling and support services to the newly graduated students of the school who will be applying to various academic programs in Delhi University.

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Report of extension activities of departments (2017-2018) Jesus and Mary College

Extension Activity organized by the Department of Psychology

• **Psychology department** organised suicide prevention awareness campaign (jijivisha) from sept. 1-8, 2017. 50 students participated in the campaign.

Extension Activities organized by the Department of History

- In February 2018, a group of 8 students of the History Department, under the guidance of Dr. Maya John, began working on an oral history project on the working class slum cluster, Baljeet Nagar, near Zakhira, Delhi. The work is ongoing. The students presented their preliminary observations at the Annual Student Seminar on how a detailed history of migrant labour and capital labour conflict in Delhi can be traced through this slum cluster. The students have been interviewing local trade union activists, and different generations of workers in the slum
- In collaboration with Political Science Department of JMC, the History Department organised a talk by Professor Mridula Mukherjee, formerly at Centre for Historical Studies, JNU on 01 September 2017, on 'Gandhi and Indian Nationalism: From Champaran to the Quit India Movement'. Approximately 150 students participated.
- Since 2018, 11 students of the History Department, under the guidance of Dr Richa Raj have been working on an oral history project on 'Mapping Gender in Delhi'. The students have conducted interviews of inspiring and influential women in Delhi such as Late Professor Aparna Basu, formerly at University of Delhi and former President of the All India Women's Conference. They have also interviewed Aanchal Malhotra, a multidisciplinary artist and oral historian working with memory and material culture. In the process, the students were trained how to conduct interviews in a video format, raise important questions and the method of transcription.
- 2018 we had a our students working on the 'Food Culture' of Daryaganj. As part of the study the students (team of five girls: Esther Gangte, Priyanka Phogat, Police Preethi, Minu and Ananya Peddibhotla) interacted with the local community at Daryaganj—migrant workers, shopkeepers, local residents, regular shoppers etc and recorded their oral histories. They also presented a paper putting forth their observations on the cosmopolitan culture evolving in Daryaganj which also struggled to keep its historical legacy. This was studied over a period of 2-3 months. The supervision was provided by Dr. Saumya Varghese, TIC and Assistant Professor, Department of History, JMC.

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- In 2018 our students (a team of 6 girls- Jisa Ann Thomas, Diya James, Elsa Rose John, Gitty Geordy, Litta Thomas, Ashmitha Thomas) also explored the Book Markets of Daryaganj and in this process once again traced the evolving of the legendary publishing houses, book stores and peddlars selling second hand books from makeshift pavement shops. This was studied over a period of 3 months. The students also presented a paper on the same entitled "Exploring the many histories of the Book Bazaars of Daryaganj" in the student seminar held by the Department in April 2018. The supervision was provided by Dr. Saumya Varghese, TIC and Assistant Professor, Department of History, JMC
- On 18 January 2019, there was a College Heritage Volunteer Workshop organised under the aegis of INTACH (New Delhi) provided a unique platform and opportunity to our students for discussions in and around heritage.
- In the year 2018 the department organised an outreach programme and collaborated with an NGO in Samaypur Badli. The students of the history department organized a collective drive and the clothes, books, shoes, etc which was donated to children who were students of the NGO.
- During the Kerala floods 2018 the students and teachers of the department collected new clothes, food and other material and collaborated with the college NSS to send these to the affected area.

Extension Activity organized by the Department of English and Mathematics

• The Golden Jubilee project of the college with NDMC was launched by the Honourable President of India, wherein the Bapu Dham school was adopted in order to enrich the students with all round holistic education. A team of students and teachers from English and Mathematics department visits the Bapu Dham School once in a week to help the students to develop the better understanding of the subjects. The EVS department has conducted several workshops for teachers and students.
