The National Service Scheme, Jesus and Mary College, is a society that works towards promoting social equality and a shared sense of compassion. With immense ardour, NSS JMC organized multiple events throughout the year.

The NSS year commenced with the annual orientation on 29th August 2018 and Dr. Veerendra Mishra, NSS Director graced the occasion as the chief guest.

On the occasion of International Yoga Day, NSS organized an event to increase awareness about the benefits of yoga, where volunteers participated and performed multiple asanas.

NSS JMC observed 'Swachhta Pakhwada', Under this event, periodic cleanliness drives took place, talks cleanliness were also organised. It also included activities like nukkad natak, poster making competition, rallies and oath taking were held throughout the year.

NSS JMC also organised Kerala Relief Donation where new clothes, baby food, biscuits, sanitary pads etc were distributed. A book collection drive was also held wherein the volunteers collected books that were donated for a good cause.

NGO month was also observed in the month of September, where leading NGOs such as Red Cross Society, CRY, Ropio, HOPE Foundation, UMEED, Aarohan and many more held sessions with the volunteers.

NSS JMC in collaboration with Systematic Voters Education and Electoral Participation (SVEEP) organised a voter ID camp in the college. Election Commission Talk was also organised in which Election Commission Officer addressed the gathering about importance of elections and the role of election commission for conducting free and fair elections. Students took pledge to vote freely and fairly without any influence of any race, community, caste or religion. The District Election Officer(East) in collaboration with Delhi University had also organised a voter awareness campaign and EVM with VVPAT demonstrations in which NSS volunteers participated.

Surgical Strike Day was celebrated to remember the glory of the Indian soldier in which NSS organised letter writing, slogan making and card making activities for our volunteers. All the letters and slogans were given to the mighty soldiers.

Candle March was organised in the college to pay tribute to the martyrs of the Pulwama Attack.

Vigilance Awareness Week was organised based on the theme "Eradicate Corruption, Build a New India" in which Students submitted hand written essays, both in Hindi and English.

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One of the biggest events of the NSS JMC year, the annual Diwali mela 'Sparsh' was organized with immense zeal in the month of October.

Beti Bachao Beti Padhao talk was organised in collaboration with Delhi Legal State Authority (DLSA). Mr. Chandranjit Singh (Judicial Officer) was the chief guest of the event.

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INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY (21st June, 2018)

On 21st June, 2018 NSS JMC organised a meaningful yoga session with full zeal and enthusiasm, promoting the international day of yoga. This session was conducted for 2 hours. Two authorised yoga coaches Meena Ma'am and Pawan Sir made our enthusiastic volunteers aware about the benefits of yoga in their hectic and chaotic life. They also demonstrated some yoga activities which helped the

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volunteers to connect their minds with their deeper self. The volunteers were also enlightened about a number of Aasans that can be performed in their daily lifestyle. The aasans were explained in detail and were further demonstrated to the students. Miss Lalita who represented the NGO at the talk spoke about the various efforts in different fields that are made by the NGO; from schools and orphanages to old age homes and vocational training centres.

CLEANLINESS RALLY (18th, September, 2018)

On 14th August, a cleanliness rally was organised which started around 12:30 pm and went on for half an hour. Many enthusiastic girls participated in the rally making it a success. Forty students along with



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the President and Vice President participated and marched outside the college gate. The rally covered areas such as Bapu Dham and Maitreyi College. As a part of the rally, students visited the adopted slum behind the British School in Chanakyapuri. CRY NGO TALK (19th September, 2018)

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF THE BLIND NGO TALK (19th September, 2018)

The NGO Month conducted by NSS kicked off its second week by having National Association of the Blind as one of the NGOs that came to hold an orientation on 19th September 2018. NAB's representative Mrs. Shantha started the talk by explaining what the organisation does and its purpose of existence.

She spoke about the various programs undertaken by the organisation to impart education and to provide skills such as computer knowledge, arts and crafts and sports to the visually impaired. She also passed around samples of paper inscribed with the Braille system dots to instil a sense of feeling and openness of mind with our volunteers. It was received very well. This was followed by a brief question-answer round where the volunteers cleared their doubts. We had a turn out of around 70 volunteers and each of them displayed great enthusiasm.

SWACHHATA HI SEVA HAI (24th September, 2018)

To mark the NSS Day on the 24th September 2018, a Rally titled Swachhta Hi Seva, poster making competition and NUKKAD NATAK was organised to raise awareness about importance of a clean environment. He emphasised on their vision 'To build a self-sustaining environment that empowers and provides direction to those in need'. An impressive number of volunteers attended the interactive session.

PRAVAH NGO TALK (26th September, 2018)

To create awareness and help students understand such motive a talk was organised by NSS JMC in association with the PRAVAH NGO. Pravah is an organisation based in Delhi works with young people to impact issues of social justice through youth citizenship action. 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mobile so she needs to be physically strong enough to deal with that situation on her own. He told that once the app is downloaded in mobile and if someone face any danger so she can shake mobile thrice so call will go to Delhi police and first 21 seconds video will start. Delhi police will come to know about it and help us. Physically strong was about to save self from any crises or danger. He taught us some techniques that if someone is trying to hurt us so how we have to save ourselves from that. Overall all it was very meaningful and helpful for all girls.



SLUM VISIT (3rd April, 2019)

NSS JMC volunteers along with the convener and the teachers visited their adopted slum near the British School on 3rd April 2019. The teachers and the volunteers met the ladies and the children of the slum and talked to them about their problems with respect to their children's studies and how the ladies can make their living by learning to make things at home which could later to be sold so that they earn some money. The unit took the responsibility of teaching the children of all age groups of the slum and also conduct workshops for the ladies so that they can learn new things which will be beneficial for them. The volunteers also distributed clothes, bags, diyas and many other useful things in the slum. The society works towards its commitment of creating avenues for students with disability to fulfil their potential and create an awareness among the members of the institution to the needs of students with disability and under-represented sections of the society. Its scope lies in creating an atmosphere of equality with special privileges to least advantaged group of the educational institution. The society also focuses on the academic discourses to sensitize the college community. Extra-curricular activities are conducted to bring knowledge and awareness among the student community.

EOC organized various events throughout the year and brought a mélange of differently abled students from across all colleges and created ample opportunities for students with disability to actively participate in various activities and be a part of various interactions.

The enrolment for EOC took place in the month of August 2018 and the volunteers started working towards fulfilling the objectives of the Cell since then. The office bearers for this academic session were Ms. *Stuti Bazari and Ms. Harshita Kalra (Presidents), and Ms. Rita James (Vice President).* The faculty members associated with EOC were Ms. Rashi Mukhopadhayay (Convenor), Ms. Khushbu Tyagi, Ms. Vishakha Kumar and Dr. Prabhjyot Kaur.

The first task which EOC undertook was that of **audio recording several readings for student with visual impairment.** The process was carried out in consultation with the student. After identifying the needs of the student, various readings/ articles/books were collected and the necessary steps were taken to record the readings. The recordings were done in a systematic manner with each recording mentioning the recording number and necessary details of the reading. This process was carried out throughout the academic year.

In the annual cultural festival of our college-Montage'19, EOC organised **'Prayas 2019'**. Prayas is an annual inter-college competition for students with disability. This year three competitions were organised: Painting, Vocal and Instrument playing competitions. The participation of students with disability from various colleges and universities was overwhelming. The event concluded with distribution of certificates and cash prizes to the winners.



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EOC organised its annual meet **'Unnati 2019'** on March 27, 2019. Mr. Gulfam Ahmed was the keynote speaker for the event. - b) Purpose of the Event: With the ongoing discussions, around "Me Too" the society decided to hold a session with speakers taking up different perspectives that revolve around the same. The session was aimed towards creating awareness and providing a platform for people to voice their opinions.
- c) Duration: 2.5 hours
- d) Number of Participants/Speakers: Participants- 70; Speakers-2

These sessions are regularly held by the society as an initiative to include non-members into debates and discussions about common notions and their counterparts. These talks are open to all and are held during accessible post-college hours.

The society has always been extremely motivated towards the promotion of gender equity. Over the years, it has not only promoted the idea of a 'safe space' within its tournament, but actively contributed to the debating circuit's move towards documents that recognize

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ground for "equity violation/ conflict resolution" based on gender. In its strive towards promoting the same, it has tried to make debating a more accessible activity to women by running tournaments in lesser hours and reducing the registration fees, etc.

The society has always approached disabilities with the utmost sensitivity and has constantly strived to provide space for the same. Our parliamentary debates held during 2017 and 2018, hosted a participant who has restrictions in physical mobility. For the same, we ensured that we provided ground floor classrooms and extra preparation time to accommodate the same. The society strives towards making disability an idea with which people attach lesser stereotypes, and encourages all to make the society more approachable for those affected

- a) Title of the Programme: Society induction (July 2018)
- b) Purpose of the Event: The session aimed at introducing spectators to the rules and expectations of the society, and the principles behind the same. It was held to allow people to become aware about the ethics followed by the society, and create awareness about the inclusivity posed by the society.
- c) Duration: 2 hours
- d) Number of Participants/Speakers: Participants- 90; Speakers-10

These sessions are regularly held by the society as an initiative to include non-members into debates and discussions about common notions and their counterparts. These talks are open to all and are held during accessible post-college hours.

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NDMC School Project

Jesus and Mary College has been actively engaging in various activities at the N.P. Co-Ed Senior Secondary School. The focus of the activities has been to generate long term synergies between the School and the College for the welfare of students attending the school. The areas identified for intervention are language, mathematics, environmental issues, psychological and physical health, sports, computer literacy, and networking with agencies who are already working in the area and can contribute to the school. The interventions aim to help the school fully utilize its existing resources and in order to make the impact of interventions sustainable, we facilitate teacher training and work on school culture that promotes enquiry and inclusive growth of students and teachers. A team of 91 student volunteer and 23 teachers have been working toward conducting baseline surveys for initial assessment and implementing various impact-oriented initiatives in the mentioned areas. The activities so far have focused on the following areas:

1. Academic Support

• Mathematics

A team of student volunteers and teachers from the mathematics department conducted a baseline survey at the school to assess the areas for intervention. The main objective of the students volunteers was to help students of class 1 and 2 overcome the fear of mathematics.

The baseline assessment was conducted using fun activities for ice breaking and thereafter testing the students on their class specific curriculum. This has facilitated a general assessment of the math abilities of the students and has formed the basis for the design and implementation of specific interventions for the identified issues.

• English

The English group for the Golden Jubilee Project at Bapu Dham school is aiming to increase the proficiency of students in English. The objectives have been to foster students' listening, speaking, reading and writing in English. The scope includes providing exposure to the English language and providing opportunities to use the language in a stress free environment. The broad strategy is to provide inputs through volunteer visits, teacher education as well as suggesting resources and opportunities for language learning.

• Environmental Studies

Environmental Studies is concerned with the exploration, investigation, and development of an understanding of the natural, human, social and cultural dimensions of local and wider environments. This requires moving beyond traditional boundaries of disciplines and looking at priorities in a shared way. The motivation and scope for EVS intervention is to build on this aspect. The focus of this initiative is to facilitate the teachers of the school:

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- to work on developing linkages between the surroundings of the child and the subject matter,
- in creating an environment wherein, the students actively participate in construction of knowledge about their surroundings,
- to create resourcefulness within the classrooms to engage students,
- to use school as a learning space to create curiosity and creativity within the child about her immediate environment,
- to engage the child in exploratory and hands-on activities to acquire basic cognitive and psychomotor skills.



2. Building as Learning Resource

A team of student volunteer and teachers have made an initial assessment of the physical infrastructure in the school with the objective of transforming the physical spaces in the school to further aid student learning. The initial assessment is now being followed up with ways in which the suggested improvements can be implemented.

3. Psychological and Physical Health Aspects

The activities in this area have focused on the needs to assess the psychological and physics needs of students of different age groups and intervene where needed. At the primary level of students, the focus has been to explore and deal with health and psychosomatic concerns that inhibit the adjustment of the child in school. At the middle level, the focus has been extended to explore and understand the development of self- concept as a notion and also investigate the gaps in the same. It has targeted to discover and deal with teenage concerns such as body image, bully behavior, peer pressure, social media, cyber bullying etc. at the senior level of students, and aimed at understanding and dealing with career concerns, performance anxiety, stress and interpersonal concerns.

Another important aspect that has been a key area of focus has been to instill awareness amongst students and teachers on aspects of physical health. In order to create awareness, workshops have been organized to sensitize students and teachers about anemia, along with an anemia camp, and menstrual health.

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4. Sports

The sports department of the college has started training the students of the school for cricket and tennis. Currently, 7-8 Students have joined the S.M Cricket Academy of the College. Further, the college has tied up with Petroleum Sports Promotion Board (PSPB) to provide training to the students of the school.

BAPU DHAM PROJECT REPORT 2018-19

PURPOSE

The Bapu Dham Action Plan, like any initiative meant to better the associated people and the society by extension, is meant to serve a manifold purpose. As mentioned before, the initiative is the Golden Jubilee project of the college with NDMC which was launched by the Honourable President of India, wherein the Bapu Dham school was adopted in order to enrich the students with all round holistic education with special focus on elementary Mathematics.

The initiative is a social welfare effort and, the first and foremost intended recipients of the success of the project would be the students of the Bapu Dham School. Developing an interest for Maths amongst them, is one of the primary objectives of the project. Maths is infamously (and unfairly) reputed to be a dry and difficult subject. Math anxiety is a real problem, affecting not only the exam results of many a student, but also creating a psychological fear for a highly useful subject. If a concerted effort is made to awaken interest in and appreciation for the subject at an early stage, we can nip the fear in the bud.

Through the thorough surveying planned under the initiative, along with one on one interactions with the students, an attempt to understand the thinking process of children will be made. Afterall, only with access to their thinking process, any solid effort to enhance their education can be made. The survey will systematically analyse the before and after outcomes of the teaching process, thus creating a database that can support decision making and innovation in the field of teaching.

Apart from the students of the Bapu Dham School, the volunteers also stand to gain a lot from the project. All of the volunteers come from diverse backgrounds and till now have had little occasion to apply their acquired knowledge to real world situations. Teaching the basics of a subject they are studying at college level, will only serve to strengthen their own fundamental concepts. Moreover, the initiative will give them an opportunity to widen their horizons, so to speak. Exposure to the conditions of students from entirely different backgrounds from their own, will give them some much needed insight.

INTRODUCTION

"Never stop believing in hope, because miracles happen every day."

With this thought in mind, Jesus and Mary College initiated a very innovative and interesting project, 'Bapu Dham school project'. This project was commenced on the occasion of 50th anniversary of our



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college, when we adopted the Bapu Dham Government Sr. Sec. School for five years, to help them study mathematics in such a way that they are not afraid of it and enjoy studying it. Learning Mathematics provides school going children with opportunities of developing the imperative foundational skills such as problem solving, deductive, inductive and logical reasoning, creative thinking and communication. This also helps them in developing their mental rigor.

As a part of this project, 5 groups comprising of 16 students, all from 2nd year, visited the school for sessions of about 1 to 2 hours in a week. Each group looked after different classes and focused on different topics for different classes. We were excited at the prospect of having a chance to allay the fear of mathematics, which is ever present amongst the students. Thus, to imprint memories of them on us and vice versa, we volunteered for cutting through their Math-phobia.



In the year 2018-19, we visited the school and the following report comprised of our experiences and the methodology that we had used during this project and also our plans that helped us to make this project successful. It also comprised of the purpose behind the project and the short conclusion.

METHODOLOGY

The aim of this project was the overall growth of students in the field of Mathematics as well as active participation.

Various techniques were designed by the Mathematics Department for the students.

<u> Techniques -</u>

1. <u>Props</u> – The use of props made the sessions more interactive as the students were able to get more involved and got a better understanding of the topic.

For example – Volunteers used of tree branches, colourful buttons and pencils to teach counting, addition, subtraction and multiplication. Use of real-life objects such as clock, notebooks, balls etc. helped to teach shapes.



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3. <u>Quiz</u> – Quiz such as row-wise quiz of counting (example – One row says number 1, the next row has to continue counting) helped students not only learn but also develop a competitive spirit and they also learned team work.

4. <u>Interactive games</u> – Interactive games such as Sit and Stand, helped us to know them better and discern if they have concentration skills, to focus on what is being said (as they have to act according to what is being said).

5. <u>Speed Maths</u> techniques were also taught to students of higher classes, which could help them reduce calculation time.

<u>6. Rewards –</u>

As students, we always wish to get some reward for our class participation. It makes us more active in the class. With this idea in mind we looked forward to appreciate the young kids by praising them for their active performance or applauding the most disciplined students in class by awarding them with the title of student of the day etc.

7. Interactive sessions –

We tried to develop a good teacher – student relationship through interaction like asking them what they want to do in future or what is their favourite movie. This served two purposes – helped the students take their mind off the calculation-heavy subject, and lead to a relaxed environment in the class.

Even as undergraduate students, we always love to interact with our teachers. They are school students, so we can imagine how happy they must be.



<u>8. Questionnaire –</u>

A questionnaire gives the teachers a better understanding of how each student of the class performs and also to get an idea if they can actually write the answers or not. The Volunteers also made the questionnaires. It helped us get a detailed idea about how much understanding of the subject each



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student has. Through this we could judge that which student needs more attention in the academic front and thus we could help them better.



Conclusively, it can be said that having been a part of this project for almost six months, till this point of time, the volunteers and the students have both gained immensely. With the aim of making mathematics more loved and less feared, we aim to involve more students with us in this noble cause of imparting the invaluable gift of education to the future of this nation. The aim would also be to keep striving for making this subject as fun-filled as possible for the students, along with helping them improve their performance in the

examinations. The improvement in the examination results would undoubtedly be a testimony to the efforts put in by the teachers and undergraduate students of the Department of Mathematics of Jesus and Mary College, and give the much-needed confidence to the school kids.





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Report of extension activities of Departments (2018-2019)

Extension activities organized by History Department

- In February 2018, a group of 8 students of the History Department, under the guidance of Dr. Maya John, began working on an oral history project on the working class slum cluster, Baljeet Nagar, near Zakhira, Delhi. The work is ongoing. The students presented their preliminary observations at the Annual Student Seminar on how a detailed history of migrant labour and capital - labour conflict in Delhi can be traced through this slum cluster. The students have been interviewing local trade union activists, and different generations of workers in the slum
- In collaboration with Political Science Department of JMC, the History Department organised a talk by Professor Mridula Mukherjee, formerly at Centre for Historical Studies, JNU on 01 September 2017, on 'Gandhi and Indian Nationalism: From Champaran to the Quit India Movement'. Approximately 150 students participated.
- Since 2018, 11 students of the History Department, under the guidance of Dr Richa Raj have been working on an oral history project on 'Mapping Gender in Delhi'. The students have conducted interviews of inspiring and influential women in Delhi such as Late Professor Aparna Basu, formerly at University of Delhi and former President of the All India Women's Conference. They have also interviewed Aanchal Malhotra, a multidisciplinary artist and oral historian working with memory and material culture. In the process, the students were trained how to conduct interviews in a video format, raise important questions and the method of transcription.
- Talk on 'Surplus Visibility? The Public University and the Indian Woman.' (2018-19)
- The Department of History organised a student seminar on 13th March 2019 on **Environmental History: Challenges and Prospects.** The resource persons Dr. Vasudha Pande (Delhi University) and Dr. Debjani Bhattacharyya (Drexel University) shared their ideas on the issues and challenges of environment from global, national and local perspectives. They also facilitated as panelists. Students from different colleges in Delhi participated and presented their research papers.
- 2018 we had a our students working on the 'Food Culture" of Daryaganj. As part of the study the students (team of five girls: Esther Gangte, Priyanka Phogat, P.Alice Preethi, Minu and Ananya Peddibhotla) interacted with the local community at Daryaganj—migrant workers, shopkeepers, local residents, regular shoppers etc and recorded their oral histories. They also presented a paper putting forth their observations on the cosmopolitan culture evolving in Daryaganj which also struggled to keep its historical legacy. This was studied over a period of 2-3 months. The supervision was provided by Dr. Saumya Varghese, TIC and Assistant Professor, Department of History, JMC.
- In 2018, students (a team of 6 girls- Jisa Ann Thomas, Diya James, Elsa Rose John, Gitty Geordy, Litta Thomas, Ashmitha Thomas) also explored the Book Markets of Daryaganj and in this process once again traced the evolving of the legendary publishing houses, book stores

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and peddlars selling second hand books from makeshift pavement shops. This was studied over a period of 3 months. The students also presented a paper on the same entitled " Exploring the many histories of the Book Bazaars of Daryaganj" in the student seminar held by the Department in April 2018. The supervision was provided by Dr. Saumya Varghese, TIC and Assistant Professor, Department of History, JMC

- On 18 January 2019, there was a College Heritage Volunteer Workshop organised under the aegis of INTACH (New Delhi) provided a unique platform and opportunity to our students for discussions in and around heritage.
- In the year 2018 the department organised an outreach programme and collaborated with an NGO in Samaypur Badli. The students of the history department organized a collective drive and the clothes, books, shoes, etc which was donated to children who were students of the NGO.
- During the Kerala floods 2018 the students and teachers of the department collected new clothes, food and other material and collaborated with the college NSS to send these to the affected area.

Extension activities organized by Department of Commerce

It is a small family divided in various Departments i.e Organising, Finance, Marketing, Technical and Content, with primary focus on polishing skills of its members in all departments. In the year 2018, the Newsletter also started focusing on topics beyond commerce, providing regular updates of the happenings around the college as well as current affairs.



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Extension activities organized by B.El.Ed Department

• 2018-2019: 148 students. Every year B.El.Ed department students conduct a study of a slum setting in terms of economics, politics, historical memories, and subsistence. They visit different slums (such as Bhatti Mines slum, Hyderpuri slum, Gulabi Bagh slum, Vikas Puri slum and the like) and interact with various people living there and develop an understanding of the intersection of geographical, socio-political, economic factors on the lives of the people. The students also visited special schools such as Amar Jawan, Aanchal, Andh Vidyalay etc. Through this the students are sensitized to the needs, interests, and potentials of the children. During internship the fourth year students identify an issue of prominence in the school. These issues range from school processes, learner identities, teacher challenges and dilemmas to issues of infrastructure, student absenteeism and the like. The students are sensitized to the issues and their impact on children, teachers and the entire school community.

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- The First Year students visit schools for the School Contact Programme. For most part the schools are mainstream schools but they also visit special schools during this programme. Students engage with the children in the schools by carrying out art and craft activities, games, music and storytelling in order to understand childhoods and children. They reflect on psychological and sociological aspects of growing up in different socio-economic contexts. In the special schools, they observe pedagogic practices of teaching differently abled children.
- A beginning has been made to collaborate the Story Telling and Children's Literature practices with the JMCEP society of the college. The Second year students carry out story telling sessions with the underprivileged children of local community.
- Throughout the academic year, the Third year students engage with the local community around the college as well as their homes. During this engagement, they study, explore and look at possibilities of developing the dimensions of local community as resources of pedagogical significance. The dimensions include physical and socio-cultural aspects of the community. In this process they become aware of the issues of the local community with the objective of becoming reflective practitioners.
- In collaboration with the Green Society of the college, the First and Third year students calculated individual plastic footprints. They also carried out a survey of the use of plastic in the college premises. The result fed into the improvement of practices of plastic consumption thereby prompting college canteen to adopt reusable stainless steel plates.



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Extension activities organized by Department of Economics

• Writers for physically challenged, autistic and dyslexic students

The students volunteered as writers for physically challenged, autistic and dyslexic students of classes 8th to 12th of Sanskriti School, Chanakyapuri in 2018. Student participation:30

• Community Outreach Project in Sanjay Camp by the Department of Economics

The **Economics Department** established a **Research and Skill Development Cell in July 2018** with the objective of training students to conduct independent research and in the process reach out to the disadvantaged sections of society. As a part of **Community Outreach**, the cell has initiated a project in the Sanjay Camp Slum (Iraq Colony) with the main objective of training students in survey methods, data collection, research in development economics and social outreach. The students of the Research Cell conducted personal interviews with the households residing in nearby slum Sanjay Camp to collect data on various indicators with emphasis on women centric variables such as menstrual hygiene, awareness about contraceptives, schooling, time devoted to household activities etc. As a token of gratitude for their time, the students distributed sanitary napkins to women. Student participation:30.



The search team comprises of 30 students and guided by the teachers of the department. A total of four rounds of field surveys have been conducted so far and the sample selection has been done using stratified random sampling technique to collect data for several parameters covering Health, Education, sanitation, Household assets and other demographic characteristics. The questionnaire was prepared using the NSSO employment and unemployment schedules. The sample size covered



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this year is 78 households with a total of more than 391 respondents. With the enthusiastic guidance of all the teachers of the department, the team is in the process of digitizing and analyzing the data . The dataset will be updated every 6 months to create a panel data structure to analyze the changes in the surveyed parameters. The objective of the project team for the next academic year is to work on issues of sanitation , menstrual hygiene and awareness in the slum under a collaborative participation network between the Anganwadis, slum dwellers and the research team. We further plan to invite research proposals from the students of the team who will then be working on individual parameters in groups with individual teachers.

The research and field work undertaken by the Research and Skill Development Cell of the Economics Department.

Activities Undertaken

July 2018-December 2018

Orientation session : An orientation session was conducted for the students by Ms. Akanksha, Ms. Akshara, Ms. Megha and Ms. Lavanya in August to acquaint them with the objectives of the cell. The session included selection of field (Sanjay Camp) for Research and Outreach, a discussion on activities to be undertaken in the semester & roles and responsibilities of the members of the cell.

Primary round of visits to Sanjay Camp : The month of September was focused on familiarizing the students with the field. Hence students were divided into groups and each group accompanied by faculty members were taken to the slum.

1. General visit to the Anganwadi Center located in the slum.

2. Group 1 - On 18th September, 2019 the first group visited Sanjay Camp with the following faculty members – Ms Smita Gupta, Ms Shalini Srivastava , Ms Megha Jacob & Ms Akshara Awasthi.

3. Group 2 – On 19th September, 2019 second group visited Sanjay Camp with the following faculty members – Dr Daisy Sales, Ms Rajni Singh, Ms Lavanya & Ms Akanksha Aggarwal.

4. Group 3 – On 24th September, 2019 the last group visited Sanjay Camp with the following faculty members – Ms Akanksha Aggarwal, Ms Lavanya & Ms Megha Jacob.

Feedback Sessions : Post the primary rounds of visits to the field, multiple feedback sessions were held in the month of October to discuss observations pertaining to living conditions of people in the slum, the various challenges that the slum dwellers faced on a daily basis, etc. Based on these sessions, the students shortlisted areas of interest and variables they were interested in analyzing.

Preparation of Questionnaire : In the months of November & December, the students engaged in



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preparing a questionnaire in order to conduct personal interviews with households in the slum and collect data. The objective was to collect information pertaining to demographics, education, health with a special focus on children and women residing in the slum. To aid them in this process, sessions were conducted by Ms. Akanksha, Ms. Megha & Ms. Lavanya on the dynamics of conducting personal interviews and preparing an objective Questionnaire for data collection.

January 2019 – June 2019

Training Workshops : In order to enable students to conduct personal interviews in the capacity of Field Investigators, workshops were conducted by Ms Akanksha Aggarwal, Ms Akshara Awasthi, Ms Megha Jacob & Ms. Lavanya in the month of January 2019.

Pilot Survey : A Pilot survey was held in the field to assess the quality of the questionnaire and make necessary changes if required.

Feedback Sessions : Multiple Feedback sessions were conducted to discuss the challenges faced during the pilot survey and brainstorm solutions to ensure that Personal Interviews are carried smoothly.

Data Collection through Primary Survey : After incorporating the necessary changes from the pilot survey, the students collected data at the household level in three rounds in the month of February, 2019.

Compilation & Analysis of Data : Three sessions were conducted by Ms. Akshara Awasthi, Ms. Megha Jacob & Ms. Akanksha Aggarwal on techniques of compilation of data collected through primary survey. This facilitated the preparation of a master dataset with information on different variables.

Preparation of Summary Statistics : Based on the analysis of data for different variables, summary statistics were prepared to give an overview of different variables such as Age Profile, Sex Ratio, Enrollment ratio, Occupational Structure, Educational Qualifications etc-. This was presented by the students of the cell to the entire Department of Economics.

Way Forward : A session was conducted by Ms. Lavanya & Ms. Akanksha with the students to discuss the plans for the next semester. Based on the discussion, the following was decided -a) Conduct an Outreach Program for women residing in the slum, b) Preparation of a report compiling findings from the primary survey & c) Dividing students into groups and developing research papers.



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Extension activities organized by B.Voc Department

B.Voc - HEALTHCARE MANAGEMENT

The Nodal Officer of B.Voc department worked diligently to bring in a partnership with the Reach Out team of Sir Ganga Ram Hospital (SGRH) to start an Out Reach Program for B.Voc students in 'Geriatrics' and 'Adolescents'.

Outreach Program in Geriatrics:

This initiative aims at providing physical & emotional support to geriatrics in need of help. This will inculcate a sense of social responsibility, develop and nurture the right values of compassion and service in our students.

- A group of our students went to an **Eye Camp** held at Geeta Bhawan in Kirti Nagar organized by the 'Reach Out' team of SGRH on 1st and 2nd February '19. The students documented the Patient's Details & made them feel comfortable.
- Some students from Geriatrics Group went to <u>Nirmal Chhaya</u>,old- age home in <u>Chhatarpur</u> on 19th February & 19th March '19 where they had an amazing interaction and learnt about the experiences and challenges faced by the elderly.



Outreach Programme in Adolescents:

The aim of this initiative is to enable our students to visit schools/institutions to counsel and guide the adolescents to help them deal with the specific challenges of this age group. To achieve this objective, students have been trained by the team of doctors from SGRH to become certified counselors.





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- The Students assigned to the Adolescent group went to **GD Salwan Public School**, Rajinder Nagar on 30th March '19 where they conducted an Orientation session for the parents on different topics such as Healthy Tiffin and Snack options for kids, overall development of children, challenges faced by working parents & Comparison between siblings.
- The students also went to **P.G.D.A.V School, Patel Nagar** on 8th April '19 wherein they conducted a session for the students of class 7 & above. They spoke on different topics such as Disadvantages of excess use of Internet, Importance of doing well in academics, Fallout of using foul language and good behaviour-a key to success.

Extension activities organized by English and Mathematics Department

• The Golden Jubilee project of the college with NDMC was launched by the Honourable President of India, wherein the Bapu Dham school was adopted in order to enrich the students with all round holistic education. A team of students and teachers from **English and Mathematics department** visits the Bapu Dham School once in a week to help the students to develop the better understanding of the subjects. The **EVS Department** has conducted several workshops for teachers and students.
